



## From the Headteacher...

As I write we are experiencing some very seasonally cold weather which is adding to the Christmas spirit. This has been a very long, exciting and packed term. We welcomed year 7 in September for their first day and they seem to have settled in very well and be enjoying life at the High School. Similarly, we were very glad to welcome year 12, both those returning and new students who have embraced sixth form life with verve and gusto. The sixth form enjoyed a very active day of team building with the Royal Navy and this term also saw A level psychology and sociology students visiting Shelton Mallet prison as part of their course. We were pleased also to appoint the student leadership team and year 11 prefects early this term and I thank them for the tremendous job they are doing. Starting early in the term, students began preparing for the Ten Tors with the Sturminster Expedition Group and congratulations to the thirteen students in the Duke of Edinburgh award who received their bronze. On the sporting front SNHS triumphed in basketball, winning 20-4 and Adam and Roy in year 12 were invited to play in a football tournament in Barcelona.

Both the open evening for prospective year 7 and the sixth form open evening took place this term, along with GCSE Awards evening and a number of students attended Dorset Leadership Academy at Bryanston. Students have continued working hard to support

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charities, raising £762.02 for Children in Need, PA for the Day with the sixth form, conducting the Harvest collection for the Vale Pantry and supporting anti-bullying week with a number of events. Links continue in MFL with our partner school in Germany, with a visiting member of staff due to join us later in the school year. Students have also participated in and led a number of curriculum events this term, including Black History month, a tremendous drama evening with year 13 and 11 and some excellent work with the Sturminster Newton Heritage Trust and Sturminster Mill. In these two subjects, Elliot received a commendation for his work with the Swanskin Seafarers Project as well as a reply from the Archbishop of Canterbury and Thea has been asked to work in technical production at the Octagon in Yeovil.

We also marked some sad occasions this term, conducting our annual Remembrance assemblies with the Royal British Legion and assemblies marking the sad passing of the Queen. The term ends on some high notes however, with a very festive Carol Concert displaying many of our students' and primary students musical and singing skills, the delicious Christmas lunch, for which many thanks to our kitchen staff and the ever popular sixth form pantomime.

My thanks to all students, staff and parents for their hard work and support this term and I hope you all enjoy a wonderful and restful Christmas.





## STEM Club

This term our KS4/5 STEM Club have been busy exploring Science and Engineering ideas beyond the curriculum. Students have been working individually or in small groups on projects of their own design based around the criteria of the British Science Association's CREST Award. Highlights have been Eva and Sophie's slime investigation, where they have been trying to design slime that could be used on a film set. Farah has made her own fizzy drink and investigated how to change the fizziness and flavour. Both of these projects will be entered for a CREST Bronze Award. Year 12s Kylah-Beth is going for gold and has been carrying out a literature review in an attempt to answer the question 'can we reverse climate change?' Gold CREST awards can take up to 70 hours to complete, so Kylah-Beth will continue with this quest over the remainder of Year 12.

Next term there will be a KS3 STEM Club during Tuesday afternoon's enrichment session. If you have a question you've always wanted to investigate, we look forward to seeing you there!

Maiden Castle & Hardy Monument - Sunday 16th October 2022

Abbots Way Walk Buckfast Abbey to Tavistock - Sunday 2nd October 2022

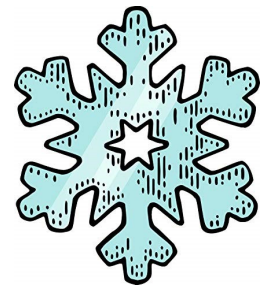


## Emergency Closure Procedure

From time to time, especially in bad weather, situations can arise when it is necessary to close the school. If such a decision is taken we will do our best to inform parents by using the school website [www.mysnhs.net](http://www.mysnhs.net) and the Dorset school closure website <http://mapping.dorsetforyou.com/closedservices> or <https://www.facebook.com/Sturminster-Newton-High-School-571299693043661/> There will also be a message left on the school answerphone as soon as practically possible. This information can also be found in the student planners.



The decision to close the school is never taken lightly. The main factor affecting this decision is that of the transport operators deciding not to run due to road conditions. This is supplemented by an assessment of the safety of the site and the ability of staff to safely travel to the school. At all times the safety of students and staff has to be our main priority. In bad weather if buses do not collect students in the morning, they will not run in the afternoon even if the weather improves.
