With the next round Mock Examinations approaching, manv students in year 11 will have increasing workload across all subjects. It is crucial that they are supported to maintain healthy and productive independent working routines to provide them with the best chance of achieving the best possible grades for their next steps after year 11. With that in mind, the English department have put together some key information regarding their examinations in English, as well as some top tips and resources that may be of interest.

Supporting your child with revising for English

Revision is vital for all students but it can lead to a great deal of stress and anxiety. We've included some tips below for parents/carers:

Key Dates for English

 Encourage your child to start revision early. There is a lot of content to cover, in addition to their other subjects. Leaving it too late will only add to stress

and time pressure.

- Help your child to be organised by creating and using a revision timetable.
- Make sure your child is spacing out the different topics over the whole of the revision timetable.
- Ask your child if you can help them to revise: test them on their knowledge, chat to them about their revision over dinner, use flashcards to help them learn quotes and quiz them on their memory.

Useful English Revision Tips and Resources

Copies of the CGP Text and Revision guides are available to purchase from your child's teacher.

As a school, we are able to purchase these at a price lower than typical RRP, and would like to pass these savings on to benefit our students. Your son/daughter will need to have in-depth knowledge of four set texts for their Literature exam. Each text guide is sold at £4 (RRP £5.95) and the Language Revision Guide is sold at £6 (RRP £12). Watching adaptations of a text (either stage or screen) can be invaluable tools to aid memory and understanding. Many of the key texts have film versions available to access via streaming services such as Amazon Prime. Be aware, however that watching a film will not further or develop understanding of the text alone, many adaptations change the script, story, or sometimes both. It is recommended that watching an adaptation of a text is used as a starting point for active revision, not the sum total of the revision itself.

Active Revision

Just reading a text or a revision guide is unlikely to be enough to improve their understanding of a topic or to remember the information or quotes. Instead, encourage your child to engage in active revision. This may be as simple as completing regular exam-style questions (these can be accessed via the AQA website, or in revision guides. Teachers also set these as regular homework tasks). Making flashcards to test themselves (or have you test them!) can also be very useful, particularly for learning quotes or Linguistic and Literary terminology. Regular practise and retrieval is far more effective long term than 'cramming' a lot of information in all at once!
